Task Description

Each of the 10 on-line tests is worth 1% of the total grade for the unit. Task Description

Part B (20%) requires students to analyse and interpret the annual reports and financial statements, then do a comparative analysis using ratio and trend analysis of prescribed companies and write an executive report in order to make an investment or a management decision.
